Dear Members and Friends,

2012 was a year of transition for the Blackstone Parks Conservancy. We made educational outreach a key part of our mission. We expanded our ties to environmental organizations to learn how best to protect and preserve the Blackstone parks in the context of our regional environment. And we reached out to more scientists to extend our knowledge base.

In 2013 we aim to keep building on these gains. There is much to learn.

Just as past benefactors planned ahead for changing times by setting aside parkland in the late 1800s and early 1900s, so must we prepare for a future we can barely imagine. As costewards with the Providence Parks Department of Blackstone Boulevard Park and the Blackstone Park Conservation District, we face new challenges.

Inspired by the highly successful Audubon after-school program that brings middle school students to our woods, we created a new emphasis on education in order to help prepare future stewards of the precious natural assets bequeathed to Providence. A seasoned educator joined our board. Under his energetic leadership the new education committee is planning trail walks, informative signs and educational materials, and links to neighbors and local schools.

In the 19th century, people anticipated further shrinking of green space, which remains a problem today. Now we, their heirs, must try to figure out how best to cope with climate change and invasive plant species in the parks entrusted to our care. We need more partners and advisors familiar with these challenges.

We also need more people willing to volunteer for the committees that plan and execute our projects. We especially need a volunteer experienced in membership/outreach. If you, or someone you know, might be interested in serving on a committee for either park, for education outreach, or for signage, please tell us. Or write to us at blackstoneparksconservancy.org.

Blackstone Park Conservancy Projects in 2012

- Produced Photo-Art Show with the Friends of Blackstone Woods and the Narragansett Boat Club.
- Joined the Providence Partnership for Parks, an umbrella organization of all city parks.
- Began in-depth research into the parks as well as interviews with local residents who remember the parks "when."
- Ran two annual cleanups on River Road.

The Boulevard

- Hired Groundwork Providence to finish pruning the north garden and refurbish the south garden. Paid Groundwork to weed, aerate, clean, water, and chip the entire park at a cost of \$12,000.
- Planted 16 trees.
- Installed a stone bench at the Trolley Shelter.
- Organized four concerts sponsored by Miriam Hospital and Butler Hospital that drew crowds of 300 plus.
- Improved and maintained the gardens at the Trolley Shelter, the small shelter, and the Witherby statue.

Blackstone Park Conservation District

- Supported Rhode Island Natural History Survey, partners and volunteers installing the federally funded *Forest Health Works project* on Angell Street in April, planting some 1200 native plants. Provided temporary fencing. Volunteers weeded and watered.
- Worked with the forester funded by the NRCS who drafted the *forest management* plan required for certain grant applications.
- Mapped the terrain of the center section to guide us in our work to stem erosion.
- As in the past, worked side by side with the AMC volunteers and the Friends of Blackstone Woods, in two productive Trail Days funded by DEM to install new water bars and line trails with logs.
