In 2013 the Blackstone Parks Conservancy (BPC) moved to a new stage in our mission of looking after the Blackstone parks with the Providence Parks Dept. and pronounced the elegant Boulevard well and truly launched after years of restoration work. And in a move made possible by a \$67,320 matching recreational trails grant awarded by Rhode Island's departments of environmental management and transportation (DEM and DOT), we pivoted toward the somewhat disheveled 45-acre Blackstone Park Conservation District.

Twenty-thirteen was also the year that our new education committee organized its first events, some of which were so popular that a few children and parents had difficulty leaving when it was time to go home. So it seemed like perfect timing when the US Fish and Wildlife Service chose Providence as one of six American cities for the Urban Wildlife Refuge Initiative and Blackstone Park as a local partner in bringing children closer to nature.

The Boulevard will always need maintenance of its trees and gardens, many planted by the BPC, and the deteriorating center path needs costly attention yesterday. But basically, this "crown jewel" of Providence is set, annually celebrated by the popular free summer concerts organized by Gale Aronson.

The conservation district, on the other hand, with its feeling of nature untamed, is losing topsoil and native plant species despite valiant efforts by BPC volunteers making small-scale repairs over the years. The DEM-DOT grant and the Parks Department support will make it possible in 2014 to attempt a larger-scale rescue affecting about five acres in a short period of time, to get a lasting foothold on the fragile center section high above York Pond and the Seekonk River. Coastal woodland like this, blessed with ponds and land and water birds, is precious. In the face of habitat loss, helping people, plants, and wild animals co-exist in a more stable equilibrium matters.

This year the education committee is humming with a full calendar of events planned for children and families, some featuring music, and many creatively involving nature activities. Looking to blend education and fun, this group is planning projects such as bird banding and building bat houses with help from the new US Fish and Wildlife coordinator April Alix, who taught middle-school children in Blackstone Park for several years. The educators are thinking of how to use the park as a rich resource for families. Engaging children in the future of these treasured parks is key to ensuring that they survive and thrive.

# Projects and Progress in 2013

## Blackstone Boulevard

- Planted 8 trees purchased with donations and an America the Beautiful grant.
- Parks Dept. installed a new roof on the small shelter.
- Maintained 4 gardens along the length of the Boulevard, and cleaned up storm damage to trees with help from a State Senate Legislative Grant.
- Held 5 summer concerts at the Trolley Shelter that were enjoyed by hundreds of people. Butler Hospital continued to support the concerts.
- Paid Groundwork Providence to weed, water, and prune entire Boulevard.

# Blackstone Park Conservation District

- Received generous Dept. of Environmental Management and Dept. of Transportation grant to upgrade badly worn trails. Requires about \$17,000 in matching funds or their equivalent.
- The Education Committee organized events bringing dozens of visitors to the park, some for the first time. Families with young children built fairy houses, listened to storytellers, sang, and created keepsakes. All ages enjoyed trail walks and a boat ride.
- On Earth Day, the BPC and Friends of Blackstone Woods volunteers ran a trash cleanup, a trail walk, and craft-making, joining dozens of other park groups in a city-wide celebration and cleanup organized through Partnership for Providence Parks.
- Lined trails with logs on two trail days with Appalachian Mountain Club and Friends of Blackstone Woods. Upgraded trail maps and developed informational signs for installation in 2014.
- The two-year-old Forest Health Works Project for native plants continues to thrive on Angell Street in the care of dedicated volunteers.
- Our new Invasives Control subcommittee organized and trained volunteers in a series of productive work days in all sections of the park. Began mapping invasive plants.

- Instituted standardized procedures and protocols for other groups working with BPC.
- Researched history of the Blackstone Parks.
